Day 1 | Aug 17, 2026

Navigating Expectations: Intercultural Communication, Collaboration, and Boundary Negotiation in Academic Research

Working in international research environments requires more than intercultural awareness. Researchers navigate complex relationships shaped by hierarchy, dependency, changing priorities, and diverse communication norms. At the same time, many experience pressure to constantly demonstrate commitment, avoid disappointing others, and solve problems independently before asking for support.

This workshop supports participants in developing the self-awareness and communication skills needed to navigate these challenges. Rather than focusing on national stereotypes or communication "scripts," the workshop develops cultural intelligence by exploring how different assumptions, experiences, and contexts shape communication and collaboration.

A particular focus is placed on moving from automatic people-pleasing patterns toward more intentional strategies for negotiating expectations, communicating workload and uncertainty, asking for help, and maintaining constructive professional relationships.

The workshop combines experiential, embodied, and highly interactive learning with short conceptual inputs and reflection.

WORKSHOP

Day 1 | Aug 17, 2026

By the end of the workshop, participants will:

- Increase awareness of how stress, hierarchy, dependency, and cultural backgrounds influence communication.
- Recognize people pleasing and overcommitment as adaptive responses that often emerge in high-performance research environments, and develop practical strategies to respond more intentionally.
- Identify the unwritten expectations and assumptions that shape communication and collaboration in academia.
- Develop greater confidence in discussing challenges, uncertainty, workload, and competing priorities with supervisors.
- Learn approaches for negotiating expectations rather than silently absorbing additional work or feeling they must simply "set boundaries."
- Strengthen their ability to ask for help, communicate transparently, and collaborate effectively in highly interdependent research environments.
- Develop cultural intelligence by becoming more aware of how different assumptions and experiences influence behavior and communication.
- Leave with practical ideas they can immediately apply in conversations with supervisors and colleagues.

PRACTICAL COURSE

Day 2 | Aug 18, 2026

Code Your Research: Python for Data Analysis & Visualization

Analyzing and visualizing research data reproducibly is key to good scientific practice, making programming skills essential for students at all levels. While Python is widely used in science, its initial learning curve can be steep for beginners moving away from graphical interfaces. The main goal of this workshop is to flatten this curve through a practical "learning by doing" approach.

We cover local setup and Google Colab, followed by core concepts: data types, variable assignments, loops, conditionals, and functions. Moving from basics to real-world application, participants will analyze self-generated and scientific datasets to answer specific questions.

We will use key tools like Pandas (DataFrames and Series), NumPy, Matplotlib and Seaborn for plotting, and SciPy and Pingouin for statistics. Hands-on scripting challenges will be solved in small buzz groups (2–3 people).

Requirements: Participants must bring a WIFI-capable laptop with administrative rights to install software. A setup guide will be provided in advance.

Day 2 | Aug 18, 2026

Visualizations: Improving Your Figures, Charts and Graphs

How can you best communicate your research visually?

In this interactive workshop topics may include general techniques for making your figures accessible to a broad audience, learning to identify and fix common visualization errors in small sample size studies (bar graphs of continuous data, creating flow charts to track inclusion/exclusion, color-blind accessible visualizations, using semi-transparency) and creating effective image-based figures (microscopy, electron microscopy, photographs, etc.).

(Visualizations for big data will not be addressed.)

PEER REVIEW & GRANT APPLICATION

Day 4 | Aug 20, 2026

Decoding Peer Review: Understanding Scientific Review Processes

Peer review is a cornerstone of scientific research. In this interactive one-hour seminar including round tables, participants will explore how manuscripts are evaluated, discuss the roles and responsibilities of authors, reviewers, and editors, and examine what makes a constructive and fair review. Through practical examples and group discussion, participants will gain a better understanding of the peer review process.

From a Research Idea to a Research Program: Why Grant Writing Matters Beyond Funding

Securing research funding is an important step toward scientific independence, and it is never too early to start developing the skills required for successful grant writing. This lecture will provide an overview of relevant funding opportunities for early-career researchers, including fellowships and funding options for postdoctoral research in Germany and abroad. However, we will then focus more on what makes a research proposal convincing: a strong scientific question, a coherent and feasible project concept, clear communication, and a compelling presentation of both the research idea and the applicant. We will discuss grant writing as a broader scientific skill that helps researchers develop, structure, and communicate their own ideas and build them into coherent research projects and future research programs.

PRACTICAL COURSE

Day 4 | Aug 20, 2026

Single-cell RNA Sequencing and Data Analysis in R

Single-cell RNA sequencing (scRNA-seq) is a powerful method that enables the analysis of gene expression at the resolution of individual cells. In contrast to bulk RNA sequencing, scRNA-seq makes it possible to capture cellular heterogeneity within complex tissues, and to identify rare cell populations, distinct cell states, and dynamic biological processes. In addition to transcriptome-wide information, scRNA-seq can also provide insights into receptor repertoires, for example, in B and T cells, making it especially valuable for signal transduction research.

The generation of scRNA-seq data is technically demanding and requires careful sample preparation, as many steps can influence data quality. In this workshop, participants will have the opportunity to pipette and process 'samples' during the first steps of sample preparation prior to sequencing, gaining hands-on insight into the experimental workflow. In a separate part, we will show how to visualize the large amount of information contained in scRNA-seq data files and how to analyze these data in R. We will also introduce basic steps for integrating two datasets to enable direct comparison between samples and to support downstream analysis.
